

Lindon Days Jr Rodeo Royalty Competition Information

The objective of this rodeo queen pageant is to choose three young ladies to represent the sport of rodeo as well as Lindon City, while preparing them for their future as a rodeo queen. Jumping into the rodeo queening world can be challenging and overwhelming. This document will provide basic information regarding what is expected of a rodeo queen, and what they will be judged on in the pageant. Along with this document, we will be hosting a rodeo queening clinic that will provide the girls in-person help, and more detailed information on how to be successful as a rodeo queen. Each Sunday, up until the week of the pageant, our instagram will post “study sundays” that will provide extremely helpful information and study material.

This document will walk you through what is expected for each portion of the pageant.

What the judges will be looking for:

- Personality and appearance
- Rodeo and equine knowledge
- Ability to communicate and educate
- Horsemanship
- Preparedness and work ethic
- Genuine kindness
- Passion for rodeo and the western way of life

Attire: Western attire should include a western cowboy hat, cowboy boots, a belt, long pants, and a long sleeve western shirt. A formal western dress may be worn for the indoor portion of the competition. A formal dress outfit should still include a hat, belt, and boots. All outfits should be appropriate.

Introduction: At the start of the pageant each contestant will be given the opportunity to introduce themselves. They can mention their name,

where they're from, and any other quick fun fact they want to add. They will then be asked one question relating to information they put on their applications.

Modeling: The purpose of the modeling portion of the competition is to showcase that the contestant is confident and poised. While each girl is modeling, her bio will be read so the judges can get to know a little bit about her. Rodeo queening modeling is similar to what you would see in any other pageant, but YouTube has some great videos to watch and get some ideas. The outfit needs to look put together and include full western attire. The more it matches the better. The most important thing is that the contestant is smiling and confident! Modeling should be timed to fit the length of the bio.

Speech: Directly after the contestant models they will give their speech. The speech should be memorized and genuine. It can be any topic the contestant chooses but should relate to Lindon, rodeo, or horses in some way. The speech should be roughly between 1 minute 30 seconds to 2 minutes 30 seconds in length.

Impromptu Questions: Contestants will be asked two impromptu questions. These questions can range from personality questions, rodeo knowledge, Lindon Days knowledge, equine science, or current events. Each girl will be asked two questions. It is okay to take a few seconds, reread the question, and think about how you want to answer. The most important thing is to stay confident and smile, even if you do not know the answer to a question. All contestants will be led to wait out of hearing range while the contestants before them answer their questions.

Interview: Interviews will be done privately and separately for each contestant. During the interview, the judges will ask the contestants questions that they have prepared to get to know each girl and their knowledge. Each interview will last 5 minutes. Preparation and studying is a vital part of the contest.

Horsemanship: After interviews there will be a break for girls to warm up their horses in the arena. The outgoing rodeo queen demonstrates the pattern for the girls. Each contestant will then complete a simple reining pattern. Please note that judges will be looking at the skill of the rider, not just the horse. It is important to smile throughout the whole pattern. Riders will be judged on their seat, posture, confidence, and ability to control the horse. It is best to complete the pattern with using only the left hand. After the contestant has completed the reining pattern, they will then do what is called a “buzz run” or “queens lap”. The contestant will lope one circle around the arena while waving to the crowd. This is what the royalty will be doing at rodeos, so this part is important. Bobby pins are also extremely important to keep the cowboy hat on! In queening there is a saying, “if your hat comes off, your head better be in it!”

Crowning: After horsemanship there will be a short break for scores to be calculated. Then the new royalty will be crowned. We are excited to say that every member of the royalty will be receiving a buckle, crown, and sash. The queen will also receive a trophy saddle.
